## From the Rector

Contemporary Surveys conducted in the United States ask a question about the Bible. Survey takers attempt to judge how seriously survey respondents take the Bible by asking them,

Which of these statements comes closest to describing your feelings about the Bible?

1. The Bible is the actual word of God and is to be taken literally.
2. The Bible is the inspired word of God but not everything in it should be taken literally, word for word.
3. The Bible is an ancient book of fables, legends, history, and moral precepts recorded by men.

(This particular example comes from the General Sociological Survey, but all national surveys such as Gallup and the NES use the same scale.)

As you can imagine, I have problems with this question. One problem I have is that absolutely every one of the proffered statements is incorrect. An atheist historian would know that option #3 is incorrect; in that, historic fact, such as the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem, is recorded in the Bible. It is also true that some Biblical accounts, such as the destruction of the city Jericho and killing of its Canaanites inhabitants, is unlikely to be true. Most archeological evidence points to a gradual assimilation of the Hebrew peoples into the Canaanite peoples. Therefore survey option #3 distorts reality.

Option #1 also makes absolutely no sense. The Bible is the word of God. The Bible is also a human constructed record of the people of God's relationship with God. How can both of these things be true? We believe that God inspired the construction of the books of the Bible as well as the selection of the text that eventually came to be called the Bible, and, in fact, we pray that God inspires the translation of those ancient texts into the English versions we read. All these things are literally true. But to ask whether the Bible is meant to be taken literally makes no sense as soon as a person has a rudimentary knowledge of the Bible's contents. The story of Adam and Eve is truth, and it is mythological truth. You would never have met two people with names tags declaring them to be Adam in Eve in a geographical location called Eden. Nevertheless, the story of how God created humanity and humanity fell from grace with God in inherently true. The same goes for Noah. However, when we get to people such as King David, Isaiah, John the Baptist, and most importantly Jesus of Nazareth, these were people of flesh and blood. Therefore, option #1 asks a question that has no true answer.

***From the Rector continued...***

All of this begs the question, what is the place of the Bible in the Episcopal Church? The Bible is the word of God, inspired in its construction, compilation, and – god willing - translation. The Bible is the story of God, the story of the people of God, and the story of the relationship between God and humanity. In different books of the Bible, different features of this story are emphasized. The Bible is our story. The collection of texts that compose the Bible has many different voices, and many different perspectives. At different points in our lives, different texts are more compelling. It has been my experience that teenagers feel pulled to the worldliness of the book of *Ecclesiastes*, and those in their late retirement years feel pulled to the deeply theocentric book of *Genesis*.

What matters for us is that we know that we are the continuation of the story. We are connected to Adam and Eve because we read the book of Genesis; and we know that we would have eaten the fruit in the garden. We know that we likely would have been like Jesus disciples, walking round Galilee watching this wonder-worker do his work, without fully comprehending what he was doing. The Bible is a story. It is a story of some people who are mythological, some people who are historic, and it is a story about us.

## **Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper**

**Tuesday, February 21st, 5:30—7:00 p.m.**

The day before Ash Wednesday is Shrove Tuesday, sometimes called “Fat Tuesday.” Centuries ago Christians often stuffed themselves with food before beginning 40 days of fasting for Lent. In those days, many Christians used up all the food containing fat, including dairy products. Because so many foods, including pancakes, used those fat products, many churches had huge feasts. A lot of people ate until they could hold no more — the beginning of all-you-can-eat dinners. Today many congregations still keep at least a semblance of the tradition. In communities around the world, churches serve pancakes on Shrove Tuesday. But today the purpose is to have Christian fellowship, not to devour everything in sight.

Mark your calendars and plan on bringing the whole family for a yummy dinner together with your Christ Church family. Tickets will be on sale on Sundays prior to this event and at the door. Look for further details in the Sunday bulletin.

### **Lent begins**

On **Ash Wednesday, February 22nd** Lent begins. During this 40-day period, Christians re-evaluate their spiritual lives. It’s a time for us to have a spiritual check-up and to strive to live the Christian life more faithfully and more intentionally.

One might go on a spiritual retreat, for example, spending time with a spiritual advisor, Bible expert or theologian. During Lent, attending the various church services and study opportunities can help people grow spiritually and become more informed about the Christian faith.

# FORGIVENESS Game

Try this twist on musical chairs.

**What you need:**

- 28 large index cards
- Black marker
- Two teams of people
- Radio or CD player

**What you do:**

1. On index cards, write out *forgiveness*, one letter per card. Make two sets (two F's, two O's, etc.).
2. Mix up the cards and form them face up in a circle on the floor. (You'll have six blanks mixed in.)
3. Have teams mix themselves up and stand in a circle around the cards. Ask an extra person to turn the music on and off.
4. As the music plays, teams walk around the circle. When the music stops, players each pick up the card nearest them.
5. Team members take their cards to a designated area and try to spell forgiveness. Any double letters or blanks go back to the "music person," who reorganizes remaining cards, spacing them evenly into a fresh circle.
6. Play continues until one team spells *forgiveness*.

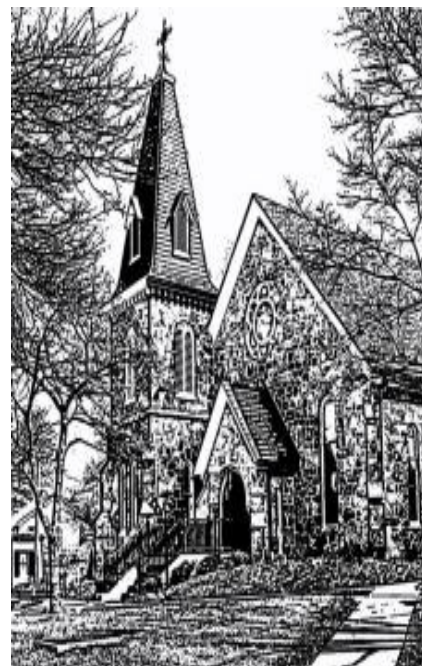
