Summer Reads

Ahh summer. For some the summer schedule is the same as the rest of the year. Others get to use the more relaxed pace of the season to find our favorite vacation spot, plop down in a folding chair, and read some kind of paperback diversion from our regular lives. For those looking for theologically enriching, and often fun, reading I have a few suggestions. A few of these are quite explicitly theological (see *Dissolution* and *Pillars of the Earth*). Two others end up exploring the depths of God's creation, because when exploring God's world-you have no choice-(see *The Greater Journey* and *Cooking with Italian Grandmothers*). I suggest you find a place to sit that is not too hot and explore God's universe.

Dissolution

The book is part of a fictional series that puts you in the company of Matthew Shardlake, a lawyer and religious reformer in the time after King Henry VIII severed the ties between the church in England and the Bishop of Rome. Shardlake investigates a murder in a monastery in southern England. If you like murder mysteries, you will like this book. What's more is that this book makes the drama of the Anglican Reformation so real that you begin to feel as one might have during those turbulent years of the 16th century.

The Greater Journey: Americans in Paris

American historian David McCullough takes you on a tour of the lives and adventures of Americans who traveled to Paris in the late/mid 19th century. Through McCullough's narrative you get to hear of how James Fenimore Cooper moved his family to Paris in the same year he published *The Last of the Mohicans*, and how Oliver Wendell Holmes went from Boston to Paris in search of advanced medical education. The relationship between American Calvinism and French Roman Catholicism is explored through the artistic education of inventor and painter Samuel Morse. McCullough has a talent for telling tales from the past with dramatic flair. I read his biography of John Adams and regularly found myself gripped with anticipation to find out who was going to be the victor in the American Revolution. I do not doubt that McCullough brought this talent of his to the tales of Americans who journey to the city of light to find adventure. McCullough prefaces his exploration saying, "Not all pioneers went west."

Pillars of the Earth

This is another novel of historical fiction set in England. This voluminous work details the development of an English cathedral town in the 12th century. Don't let the books 1008 pages intimidate you, this is a pulp fiction romp with plenty of adventure, intrigue, and architecture. Yes, the author takes great delight in presenting the construction of a magnificent cathedral in between chase scenes, or rather lurid description of love affairs both licit and illicit. This book is not for the faint of heart, but it paints an earthy and compelling picture of those who glorified God by building grand worship spaces.

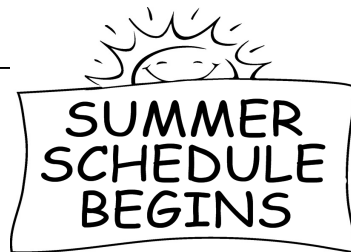

Cooking With Italian Grandmothers

If novels and history books are too laborious for you, read a cookbook. Many cookbooks contain as much lore about their subject as they do recipes. The cookbook by Jessica Theroux details her intensive journey through Italy in which she befriended matrons known for their culinary talent. Theroux mixes recipes for Risotto Milanese with stories of a grandmother from Milan named Maria. Maria's life story and her cooking are deeply intertwined. Theroux's storytelling does the same with Maria's biography and recipes. For anyone who has a beloved grandmother known for her cooking, this book will bring it home, and teach you how to cook like grilled tuna with coriander and mint just like grandmother Maddalena does in Sicily.



Sunday Worship *July 3rd through September 4th*

Update From the Vestry

We have incurred higher than expected costs in two areas critical to our Church structure. They are:

- As a result of roof damage and resulting leaks on our organ, our organ was significantly damaged. It will cost about \$8,000 to repair the organ and roof area.
- Our entry doors at Franklin Street and at the entrance of our Preschool need to be replaced to improve security and to be more energy efficient. We anticipate costs for these doors to be around \$11,000.

It is our intention to raise the money for these necessary repairs throughout the upcoming year. If you would like to make a contribution to these repairs please contact Rita in our parish office. Thank you for your thoughtfulness and prayers.

Food for thought...

Vocation Time

It's powerful to know that God is using you to accomplish amazing things. Summer can provide opportunity for such experiences. Call it a "vocation vacation"! (A vocation is something God calls you to do.).

If you're planning a family trip, for example, call ahead and offer to donate some time at a local homeless shelter or urban ministry. Ask for a short tour, as well. If you want to hike in the mountains, contact a Bible camp to see if they need volunteers.

Call a local YMCA, parks-and-recreation department or volunteer hotline to see where assistance is desired. Other possibilities include volunteering programs that allow people with special needs or the elderly to enjoy outdoor activities.

You'll enjoy summertime fun (vacation) and the knowledge that God is working through you (vocation).

Praying Twice

According to legend, the early theologian St. Augustine of Hippo said, "He who sings prays twice". (The Latin wording is actually "He who sings well prays twice," but more on that in a moment.)

Singing, a common element of worship, is a handy way to help children pray.

My 6 year-old, who loves to sing, was surprised and delighted when I told him a praise song he had just learned could also be his bedtime prayer. He sings off-key, forgets some words and doesn't want help from Mom; he just sings his heart out.

But what of churchgoers who stay silent during hymns, fearful that they don't sing well enough? Forget the Latin translation! Long before Augustine, a psalmist wrote, "Make a joyful *noise* unto the Lord, all ye lands!" (Psalm 100:1, KJV). Why not pray twice today?

Over the summers I'm counting the days...

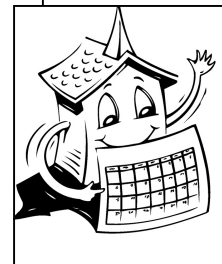
Until a new year begins and , I see old and new faces

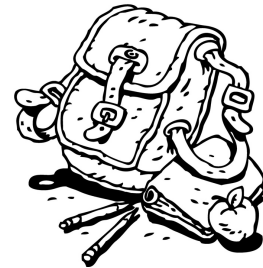
FILL THE BUS

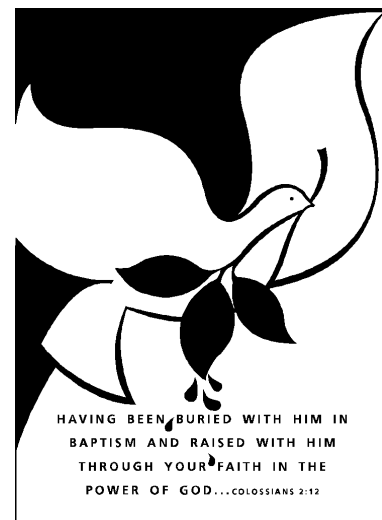

PATRIOTIC PARFAIT

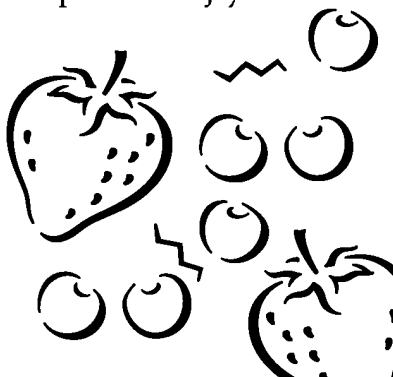
On the 4th of July, make this healthy, festive dessert to share with family and friends.
